Vocabulary					
Family	There are many different <b>definitions of family</b> , such as 'a fundamental social group in society typically consisting of one or two parents and their <b>children</b> ' or 'a group of two or more people who are related to each other by blood, adoption, marriage, step, or fostering, and may or may not dwell in the same house.				
Single parent	<b>Single-parent</b> families are families with <b>children</b> under age 18 headed by a <b>parent</b> who is widowed or divorced and not remarried, or by a <b>parent</b> who has never married.				
Same sex parents	LGBT <b>parenting</b> refers to <b>lesbian</b> , <b>gay</b> , bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) people raising <b>one</b> or more <b>children</b> as <b>parents</b> or foster care <b>parents</b> .				
Step family	A <b>stepfamily</b> is formed by the marriage or long-term cohabitation of two individuals, when one or both have at least one <b>child</b> from a previous relationship living part-time or full-time in the household. The individual who is not the biological <b>parent</b> of the <b>child</b> or <b>children</b> is referred to as the stepparent.				

Foster parent	<b>Foster parents</b> are people who officially take a <b>child</b> into their family for a period of time, without becoming the <b>child's</b> legal <b>parents</b> . The <b>child</b> is referred to as their <b>foster child</b> .
Adoptive parents	An <b>adoptive</b> parent is someone who provides a permanent home to a <b>child</b> or <b>children</b> through a legal process Becoming an <b>adoptive</b> parent comes with all the joys, heartache, laughter, frustration, responsibilities and rights that a natural or biological parent- <b>child</b> relationship brings.
Blended parents	A <b>blended family</b> is one where the parents have <b>children</b> from previous relationships but all the members come together as one unit.
